Scleroderma produces a mummy.

The hands [in scleroderma] are converted into rigid, immobile organs. In severe cases the unfortunate victim is as though he had been put in the fabled shirt of Nessus [the bloody shirt of a centaur killed by Hercules for trying to carry off his wife], which had gradually contracted upon him. The back is rigid, the neck is fixed, and he may resemble a frozen corpse or a mummy, without the power of motion, save in eyes and tongue, which alone gives witness to remaining life.
